Your new Management Committee is here to steer the Club, but we are always looking for new ideas – and there is no such thing as a bad idea. MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING ON OCTOBER 21/21

Wayne Gallant proposed the adoption of the August meeting Minutes. The Minutes were adopted unanimously.

Michael Purcell, President called for reports:

Secretary John Beales reported that he had completed and submitted the update to the Halton Community Services Database outlining all the contact information for the club. He also reported that it was the time of the year to update the club information to Probus Centre re the new Executive, head count and pay fees. He will attend to this.

Treasurer Tony Pinchen reported that as of August 31st the club had a balance of \$8,226. During September we had a net of fee revenue and expenses of \$375 for a balance of \$8,601. We currently have a total of \$423 in outstanding cheques to be cashed producing a true cash balance at the end of September of \$8,177.

Speaker: Alan Screen reported that today's speaker is Donald Smith who will speak on Indigenous matters.

In November Ian Hamilton an author will speak on Chinese topics. Tim Burrows will return in January to give us an update on the topic of electric cars.

Activities Russell Mewse reported that unfortunately we have had to forfeit our deposit to the Atrium for the Christmas luncheon as we were in no position to commit to a specific number of attendees at this time.

Membership Peter Pretty reported that we have 56 paid up members and 1 unpaid renewal for 57 members. We started last year with some 70 members but due to resignations and deaths the total has shrunk to 57. He hoped we could build the number up again.

Web Site Paul Nelson had nothing new to report

President Mike Purcell gave an enthusiastic update to the members,

He stressed the need to reinvigorate the membership now that we are emerging from phase 3 of the pandemic lockdown. As of today we are limited to 36 attendees in the Pine Room but with restrictions removed it can accommodate 120. He urged all members to actively try to recruit new members. He then announced 3 new initiatives:

1) The Communications Committee under Roy McEwen has been reconstituted. Roy will be assisted Don Jack, Brian Noble, Jim Smith and Tony Pinchen. They will be calling to remind and encourage members to attend our meetings.

2) The club has acquired 4x \$50 gift certificates to Pasquale's restaurant in Oakville. They will be used for a random draw at meetings to encourage turnout over 70%.

3) Some of the gift certificates will be used as a random draw for new members and

their sponsor.

The 50/50 draw has been cancelled for the immediate future due to the Town regulation for a license fee for raffles which renders our draw unprofitable. A compromise is being sought.

Arrangements have been made for lunch at Chuck's Roadhouse at 379 Spears Road.

That being the conclusion of the business of the meeting we moved on to the speaker for today.

Donald Smith is a retired professor of History at the University of Calgary. He was raised in Oakville and educated at U of T, Laval and back to U of T for his PhD

His topic covered the lack of recognition of the indigenous history, culture and treaty rights by the predominantly Anglo influenced population of Canada up until the 1960's. He spoke of his book "Seen But Not Seen" which deals with this issue.

He became aware of the indigenous history when he was working on his MA a t Laval. There he was exposed to a highly detailed record of indigenous records which alerted him to the problem.

In thinking about the matter he realized that growing up in Oakville he was not aware of any of the indigenous history of the area. The total lack of any recognition or understanding of such matters amazed him and sparked an interest that powered his academic career.

Although his presentation was interrupted by technical difficulties he delivered an impassioned talk pointing out that only now after the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the unmarked graves in the residential schools that Canadians beginning to truly become aware of serious issue facing the country.

Due to the connection problems we were only able to ask a few questions. However, it was an interesting and important topic.

Following the presentation Mike Purcell declared the meeting adjourned.
