FEATURED SPEAKER – May 18, 2023



Captain Caroline McGuire

This month, we are delighted to introduce **Capt. Caroline McGuire, Air Canada, who commands a Boeing 737 'Max'.** Caroline began her flying career in 1986 and eventually joined Air Canada in 1999.

Caroline originally attended UBC to study Psychology, but after a short time she was bitten by the itch to fly; she completed her Psychology degree and trained as a pilot in the summers. After graduating, she became an instructor in Vancouver; she then flew in Canada's Northwest Territories flying a Twin Otter. Caroline then returned to Vancouver to fly a small twin turboprop, Navajo, which carried cargo and a small number of passengers. As a 'bush pilot', Caroline

and her colleagues often helped fuel the aircraft, load cargo/luggage and then fly. She was **often the sole pilot** to remote locations in Canada's West Coast e.g. Bella Bella, Campbell Island in the Central Coast Region. (*Editor's note: Caroline doesn't 'do' luggage any longer, having had her fill in the bush - so no Qs like 'where is my luggage now'!)*

In 1995, Caroline joined Kelowna Flightcraft to fly the Boeing 727. She started as a second officer, flying Purolator cargo and Greyhound operations. She became a first officer a short time later. Moving to ON in 1997, Caroline flew the de Havilland Dash 8 for Air Ontario, now Jazz. An opportunity arose to take a short leave of absence from Air Ontario and to fly a Dash 8 for Air Gabon, **in Equatorial Africa**. There, her fluency in French and her experience in the Far North here, made her a natural candidate to fly across jungle and around many thunderstorms, relying on instincts and nerve instead of sophisticated infrastructure to take supplies into remote oilfields. Her stories about aborting landings on jungle airstrips because of **elephant traffic on the approach** are sure to give you a chill!

At Air Canada, Caroline has seen service as a **First Officer and/or 'relief pilot'** (*Editor's note: don't say 'co-pilot' or you may <u>never</u> find your luggage) on the Airbus A320, A340, Boeing 777 and now as Captain on the Boeing 737 'Max', primarily across North America and the Caribbean. Very shortly, she will retrain as a Captain of the 787 'Dreamliner', flying to Europe, Asia and other destinations.*

Captain McGuire is a proud member of the **industry's '5%-ers'** (female pilots in a maledominated profession) who mentor graduate-entry female pilots-in-training so as to raise the number of females in command in our skies. **Welcome Caroline!**

Our speaker Lorena Mallinson was introduced by Roy McEwen

This month, we are delighted to introduce Detective Constable Lorena Mallinson, a 28-yr veteran of the Halton Regional Police Service ("the Service"). The Service was established in tandem with the creation of the Regional Municipality of Halton on January

1,1974. It incorporated the former police services of Burlington, Oakville, Milton and Halton Hills.

Currently, the Service has over 1,000 members, including 718 sworn police officers and approximately 302 civilian and volunteer members. The Service, housed in a new modern 230,000 sq. ft. building on the North Service Road, is responsible for policing a population of approximately 610,000 people in an area covering nearly one thousand square kilometers.

Lorena has worked in a variety of roles in policing and has spent over 8 years specializing in frauds. Today, we learned, amongst other things, that various types of crime in our catchment areas are on the increase and crime is becoming more sophisticated as well as more violent (see links below). The Halton Regional Police Service is widely known as one of the most progressive community policing services in Canada with its strong emphasis on the community. Community policing in the Halton region is a philosophy based on the concept that police officers and members of the public work together to affect an appropriate policing response. We are grateful to Lorena and her colleagues who work to keep us safe under changing conditions.

The Message:

There are Liars, Cheats and Thieves out there ready to take advantage of anyone vulnerable. They appeal to your emotions and to the logical side of your brain.

Fraud is theft by deception

Types of scams:

Lottery or sweepstake where they say you have won money but you need to send money to get it. They ask you to keep it secret, send it via bitcoin or money transfer. If they call, HANG UP

Grandparent scam where they pretend to be related and need money to get out of jail or to pay for car damage. Again, they say don't tell anyone.

Dating or Romance Scam aka Investment scam. The person asks for small investments which grow in size until he/she takes all they can.

In some cases, photos are exchanged, some in a comprising pose and this can easily lead to blackmail

CRA/Service Canada Scam when they try to get into your CRA account and steal SIN#, tax info etc. Leads to identity theft as they take out loans and credit cards in your name.

Service Scam when they take possession of your computer. It starts with a notice not to turn off your computer but call this number to get it sorted out.

The first thing to do is turn off your computer.

Phone Number Spoofing, it may look like a local number but they can be calling from anywhere in the world. Don't trust.

Door to Door Scams, while unsolicited door to door selling is illegal, there are still companies that have their reps knocking on door to sell/rent water heaters, air conditioners etc. plus home

service agreements at very high interest rates. Do not let these people into your house.
