(**Note:** ¹ This stated desire to "go home now" is not necessarily to a physical location, but more so to a place of comfort, real or imagined, in the speaker's mind.)

This month, we are delighted to welcome **Cait Bowie** who will chat with us on the broad subject of dementia, of which **Alzheimer's** is one well-known, but not necessarily well understood, disease.

Cait received a diploma in Recreation Therapy from Mohawk College, as well as a B.Sc. in **Nursing** from McMaster University. She has collaborated with people living with dementia in **both long-term care and hospital settings** and assisted with **the care of her own Grandmother** throughout her journey with dementia.

Sometimes, we use inaccurate descriptors about dementia or other mental /physical ailments. We may do this often because of ignorance or embarrassment. **Cait** will guide us through the professionally accepted way of diagnosing Dementia in Canada and **separate fact from fiction**. There is no one specific test that can diagnose dementia. By understanding our medical history and examining our physical and mental status, our doctor may provide us with a diagnosis, recommend further exams, or refer us to a specialist. **We can be proactive** and get the ball rolling if we wish to understand what may be happening to us, **regardless of our age**.

SPEAKER

Ernest Ewaschuk introduced our speaker----Dr. Myriam Nafte


Myriam took the Podium at 10:35 and kept us in rapt attention for an hour and then proceeded to unveil some relics and art work that she brought with her to support the topic of 'Trophies & Talismans'.

Her presentation focused on several themes:

- The dilemma Police Forces have when discovering bones and how best to categorize and manage them;
- Disposed and undisposed remains and the relevant Laws in Canada;
- The 'trade' in human remains that persist and is very profitable;
- The various organizations, including Churches and private collectors that are 'the market' players;
- Religious traditions that govern relics;
- Tribal societies where bones are the centre of funereal tradition.

During her research interviews, Myriam spoke with an extensive list of collectors, some of whose 'trophies & talismans' she (initially) found disturbing and appalling. Some of these collectors' items, however, had moving personal stories attached (e.g. a miniature 'Stars & Stripes' flag which was made partially in human skin and which was a poignant reminder to the owner of how his family donated their own skin grafts to their daughter (RIP) who was badly burned in an accident.

Notable in her comments was a reference to the fact that even reputable funeral homes in Canada sometimes trade in organs without the express permission of a deceased's next-of-kin.
